I hope that you were able to attend "100 Years—Votes for Women," the local celebration of the centennial of Wisconsin's ratification

of the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution on June 10. The event was organized by the Women's Fund of the Community Foundation of Southern Wisconsin and the LWV of Janesville, with the aid of a generous donation from the major event sponsor, Blackhawk Community Credit Union. You can view JATV's video recording of the event beginning Wednesday, June 26. We expect that you will also be able be to view it on JATV's YouTube channel soon so you can share the event with friends who live outside of the Janesville area. We are grateful to the Women's Fund board for inviting the LWV to join them in organizing the event and in sharing the net proceeds.

I am happy to report that our Janesville member, **Kay Deupree**, is the recipient of the 2019 **Meg McLane Award for Advocacy**. This annual award from the League of Women Voters of Wisconsin recognizes one individual League member who works as a citizen advocate through the League of Women Voters and/or other organizations for positive policy changes in Wisconsin. Kay received her award at the LWVWI Annual Meeting in Green Lake on June 8 and gave an inspirational speech in accepting her award. Kay has gener-


As a reminder, your League membership comes due

Resolution No. 2019-1668
A resolution commemorating the 100th anniversary of Wisconsin ratifying the 19th Amendment.

WHEREAS, on June 10, 1919, the State of Wisconsin led the nation as the first state to ratify the 19th Amendment, allowing women the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin women fought for the right to vote for more than a century before it was granted, and persevered in the face of resistance; and

WHEREAS, the fight for women's suffrage, from the women's rights convention to enfranchise, emt, lasted 72 years, with women from all walks of life, political views, and demographic backgrounds asking for the right to voice their opinions at the polls; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin women by the thousands advocated for the right to vote on the streets, in newspapers, and in the state and federal capitols; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin-born Carrie Chapman Catt led the national movement meeting with President Woodrow Wilson to secure his support for suffrage in light of women's contributions during World War I; and

WHEREAS, Other Wisconsin women, like former First Lady Belle Case LaFollette and Reverend Olympia Brown, garnered national attention for their suffrage efforts as well; and

WHEREAS, it took male allies to support women in their endeavor to vote, for it was sons, husbands, and fathers who ultimately heard the calls of women and took the historic vote on June 10, 1919; and

Whereas, daughters, granddaughters, and great-granddaughters of the women who fought so hard to vote have been making their voices hear at the polls or 100 years; and

WHEREAS, most of the women who began fighting for the right to vote never lived to see the enfranchisement of women; and

WHEREAS, today, women are running for office in unprecedented numbers, with many current politicians, both male and female, remembering that they follow in the footsteps of these great suffragists; and

Whereas, the Women's Fund, in partnership with the Janesville League of Women Voters, is celebrating this historic victory in a special event titled "100 Years: Votes for Women March for Progress and 'A Living Story'" taking place this evening; and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the City of Janesville Common Council that June 10, 2019 commemorate the 100th anniversary of Wisconsin ratifying the 19th Amendment, reaffirming the City's commitment to empowering and uplifting the voices of women within the community.

Nancy Stabb read the City Council's Resolution to those gathered.
