


Communications from the President

Part 3 DEI Committee's series on Race - The Power of an Illusion

Eileen Newcomer DEI Committee

On Saturday, May 11th, League members and other community members gathered at Basics Cooperative to watch and discuss "The House We Live In," episode three of the series Race - The Power of an Illusion. This third installment of the series spotlights how our social institutions "make" race by providing different groups vastly different life chances even today, decades after the Civil Rights Act. These realities are illustrated in the film through a close look into how housing discrimination has led to dramatic racial disparities in

generational wealth accumulation and the impact of our country's history of denying citizenship, including the rights and privileges that go along with it, to nonwhites in the United States.

After the film, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee Chair, Mary Buelow, led an engaging group discussion. The discussion began with initial reactions to the film, then became more personal as the group considered how the ideas discussed in the film relate to racism and housing issues in Janesville both historically and in the present day.

didate forum and created links to JATV's video recording from our League's website and Facebook page; Posted written responses of Janesville Board of Education candidate on our website;

April: Hosted lecture presentation, "Pathways to Citizenship: Processes, historical and present, of becoming a citizen of the United States" by Dr. Beatrice McKenzie of Beloit College at UWW at Rock County. Passed out voter registration information to over 100 students and helped several students register to vote at the **Safe Today and Tomorrow program** for Craig HS upperclassmen; Attended public hearing of the Joint Finance Committee and submitted written comments on behalf of our League that focused on budgeting for redistricting reform and election security

Through the Spring: DEI Committee conducted a series of viewing and discussion session for the fulllength versions of Race: The Power of an Illusion on the second Saturdays of March, April and May at Basics; Group began informal study into problems of homelessness and affordable housing **in Janesville**; Created opportunity for us to accept online payments of dues and donations on our **League website** through Paypal; Worked with the Women's Fund board to plan a June 10 celebration of Wisconsin's ratification of the 19th Amendment
